We cannot do all that we do without you, our donors. May you feel the depth of our gratitude flowing from our hearts to yours – the very meaning of Heartlink.





Visionary Practice and Regenerative Leadership Doctoral Program

It's an exciting time for the doctoral program as we enter the heart of Winter Term. Several streams of activity are flying along. The incoming cohort of students are enjoying their Winter Term doctoral courses. In VPRL 630, Dr. Greg Cajete's (Santa Clara) Traditions in Native American Thought: New Minds and New Worlds, students are learning about the life experiences and philosophical adventuring of Viola Cordova (Jicarilla Apache) while building out their deep engagement via creative journaling and discussion groups. In VPRL 640, Regenerative Leadership with Dr. Pramod Parajuli, students are exploring how dimensions of regenerative culture such as climate-responsive foodsheds, fibersheds, and doughnut economics can help them collaboratively design their vision-seed projects.

Some students are incubating the first of their self-directed studies in topics such as Color Psychology for Youth Resilience, HeartMath for Veterans, Mestiza Identity with Archival Research, Suquamish Tribal Fiber Weaving Techniques for Accessing Ancestral Design, and Appalachian Permacultural Food and Gardening Traditions. Ongoing meetings with VPRL Doctoral Mentor Faculty supports the cultivation of these unique learning opportunities.

Second-year, full-time students are proposing their research protocols and beginning to meet with their newly formed Wisdom Councils. Students are exploring how to use multi-cycle qualitative coding on arts-based responses to innovative curriculum in ethical and life-giving ways. Others are developing detailed project planning for their writing, research, travels to Africa, and heuristic inquiries in creative response to ancestral archives.

In this time of depth and nature's quiet, the program is nurturing the lunar qualities of subtle luminosity, nuance, shade, intuition, sanctuary, relationality, and flow in reciprocity with the solar qualities of brilliance, radiance, warmth, clarity, group genius, and the spirit of energizing adventure. This enriching reunification and reclamation of ways of being and knowing is nurturing regeneration from educational trauma and annealing and healing the possibilities of education itself as these inspiring learners and seekers continue to embody Southwestern's Mission, *To Transform Consciousness through Education*.

Katie tailors transformational approaches into her work with the anticipation that the needs of each student and client are met. She is passionate about advocating for systemic change and providing trauma-informed spaces focused on cultural humility—valuing and affirming those who have been historically marginalized, traumatized, and impacted by ecological systems and cultural hegemony. Katie aims to facilitate culturally responsive learning spaces that create future counselors who are change agents able to effectively advocate for clients and support making improvements to the counseling field on local, national, and global levels. As a white cisgender woman, she continues to critically evaluate her privilege and unlearn her own socialized biases, unknown objectives, and stereotypical beliefs. Specifically, Katie's work with Transgender and Gender Expansive Folx and those whose affectional orientation or romantic attraction defy heteronormativity continues to influence her own personal and professional development as an antiracist, culturally responsive, counselor and counselor educator, scholar, play therapist, and clinical supervisor.

Description: Myths are timeless and so is our soul. Presenter Bio: Marialuisa Diaz de Leon Zuloaga MA, REAT, MSMT, MSME, is a somatic movement specialist, mythologist, educator, researcher, international presenter, and performer born in Guadalajara, Mexico where she obtained her B.A. in Psychology and discovered her love of dance. Marialuisa's professional experience in psychology, somatics, and the arts, spanning over twenty years, includes work in education, private practice, and community. She is the creator of Mythic Life: Embodying Wisdom, Beauty and Courage, where she brings her expertise and passion to the work women's empowerment through the integration of myth, arts, somatic movement and archetypal psychology. The Psychedelic Experience: Transcendent Personal Growth And Transformation Presented By: Amy Wong Hope, Ma, Lcsw

Dates/Times: Saturday & Sunday, 2/17 & 2/18, 9am-6:30pm | LOCATION: Zoom Synchronous

Description: Explore the mystical and transcendent experiences common in psychedelic-assisted therapy interventions. Indigenous traditions and their influence on current therapeutic usage of psychedelic compounds will be explored. The phenomenology of the transformation process from clinical and ethical standpoints, and the qualities, stages, and variables that define the psychedelic-assisted therapy experience will be discussed. Students will have the opportunity to participate and/or see experiential exercises that simulate these phenomena. Students will analyze how best to take advantage of adaptive neuro-plasticity activated to integrate changed perspectives and behaviors. Students will assess how the variables of facilitator or therapist approaches, group or individual usage, location, music, and many other aspects in the set and setting affect the psychedelic experience of the participant. 16 CEUs that toward the Psychedelic Studies Certificate.

Presenter Bio: Amy Wong Hope, MA, LCSW, is the Certificate Program Director of the Psychedelic Studies Certificate. Amy is trained as an MDMA-assisted therapist through the (MAPS) Multidisciplinary Association

for Psychedelic Studies and co-author of Small Doses of Awareness: A Microdosing Companion (due to be published spring 2024). Amy maintains a private practice with a focus on trauma-informed modalities and shame-resilience approaches that support clients in restoring emotional, somatic, and relational resiliency.

Description: Grief gives us the chance to continuously heal and grow so that we can find balance in our lives, with joy and sorrow bridging an always changing world. This course describes the grief process from various perspectives and treatment models, including interpersonal neurobiology, cognitive behavioral theory, positive psychology, and the work of Elizabeth Kubler-Ross. Students will have the opportunity to examine their own experiences of grief and loss including tracking common stages of the grief healing process moving from futility to hope. Cultural considerations for marginalized populations, complex bereavement, disenfranchised grief, traumatic grief, disease-related grief, and the creation of effective support systems will also be explored. 16 CEUs that toward the Trauma, Grief and Renewal Certificate.

Presenter Bio: Rev. Dr. Ted Wiard, EdD, LPCC, CGC, for the last twenty-five years has worked with transformation from loss through the lens of his own experience and as a therapist, researcher, and author. He founded Golden Willow Retreat outside of Taos, NM, an emotional healing sanctuary focused on loss, trauma, and grief. Dr. Wiard is the director of the grief, loss, and renewal certificate program at Southwestern College. Ted co-authored Witnessing Ted: The Journey to Potential through Grief and Loss. Ted's passion lies in supporting healthy transformation for people, families, communities, and organizations in the midst of change.






Announcing the publication of *Small Doses of Awareness: A Microdosing Companion*, published by Chronicle Prism on February 20, 2024.
